FORMAL COMPLAINT ABOUT THE WAPPING BUS GATE CONSULTATION

The St Katharine & Wapping Ward Panel formally object to the way in which this consultation is being conducted, and request it be immediately pulled, on the following grounds:

- 1) The Wapping Bus Gate community-led engagement predates the Liveable S treets project by 2 years. The St Katharine & Wapping Ward Panel made a presentation to of LBTH about the commuter traffic rat run through Wapping on 5th December 2017. This was followed up by the Council commissioning Project C entre (PCL) to undertake a survey and it reported on the Wapping Bus Gate in the Document R ef: 5318 dated 15th May 2019. The official consultation dates were 21st February-8th April 2019. The Bus Gate project was therefore entirely resident-led and was not anything to do with the Liveable S treets P roject which followed later in 2019. Therefore, there is no remit in your manifesto to remove the Wapping Bus Gate which has the support of 95% + of local residents because of the improvement in road safety and environmental health for pedestrians, cyclists and children alike.
- 2) The Survey Question wording is confusing and the tick boxes should be re-worded and repositioned in ranking, to bring clarity to the responses sought, and need to be amended to read:

SUPPORT REMOVAL OPPOSE REMOVAL NEUTRAL ABOUT REMOVAL

- 3) 30 paper versions of the survey were put through the lobby door of my block of flats. None was addressed individually to residents and none had an address on the letter. When responding by post, the only identity you are required to provide is a postcode. Anyone could have picked up all 30 letters and filled in the survey to suit their personal preferences, thereby fraudulently misrepresenting the true views of Wapping residents. Furthermore, residents could complete the paper version and then duplicate their response which allows you to proceed without any survey code. The survey has no integrity as a result.
- 4) Best practice, as the LGO suggests, requires that you should plan for up to 6 12 weeks for a consultation exercise. The Gunning Principles, to which you refer in point 7 of your manifesto, are not being adhered to, as you have not given sufficient context and information for the basis of your review and you have not provided enough time for people to think things over.
 In our opinion, you have failed to run the statutory consultation in line with the required standards as laid down by the Gunning Principles and the Local Government Ombudsman.

Please acknowledge this complaint has been received and is formally logged in your Complaints Register and that I am provided with the complaint reference number. I have copied this letter to The Minister of State for Local Government, the Local Government Ombudsman, the Mayor of London; The Chief Executive of LBTH and our local elected councillors.

BENEFITS OF THE BUS GATE

- The bus gate was introduced in response to a campaign from Wapping residents whose lives were blighted by rat-running and the heavy congestion, pollution, danger to pedestrians and noise it caused.
- The bus gate long pre-dated the Liveable S treets project and should not be seen as part of that scheme.
- The bus gate has been enormously successful and overwhelmingly supported by the people of Wapping, particularly since local residents have been able to obtain exemptions.
- The vast majority of the vehicles passing through Wapping prior to the gate being introduced used the area solely as a rat-run to avoid just 0.7 miles of The Highway. In comparison, the rat-run from The Highway at Glamis Road, along Wapping Wall, Wapping High Street, Vaughan Way and back to The Highway is almost twice as long at 1.3 miles.
- A council review published in August 2020 found that following the introduction of the bus gate journey times on The Highway were less than two minutes longer going west and actually reduced going east.
- After the bus gate was introduced, pollution levels in Wapping dropped significantly. The review found levels of PM2.5 particulates, the sort of pollution that is most dangerous to our children because it goes deep into their lungs, fell by up 90 percent.
- The narrow, cobbled streets of Wapping suddenly became much safer for our children walking to school and for other pedestrians and cyclists. The D3 and 100 buses became more reliable and were no longer delayed by heavy congestion.
- The effect of the bus gate was to keep traffic on The Highway where it should be as a road designed for the purpose. If traffic on The Highway is slow-moving it is the responsibility of **TfL** to deal

with it, <u>not</u> the Mayor of Tower Hamlets. The Highway is not a road that Tower Hamlets has any jurisdiction over

- The bus gate had no impact whatsoever on the ability of emergency services to access any part of Wapping. Taxis, including those for people using taxi cards, could continue to access all parts of the district on either side of the bus gate through the five access roads into the area.
- Removing the bus gate would reverse a measure that has hugely improved public health, quality of life and safety in Wapping. It would be impossible to square with Mayor Rahman's manifesto commitment to green the borough and reduce pollution.

Thank you for your letter, sent on behalf of the St Katharine and Wapping Ward Panel, about your concerns with the London Borough of Tower Hamlets's proposal to remove Wapping Bus Gate, as part of the Councils' Livable Streets consultation.

I am aware that the London Borough of Tower Hamlets (LBTH) is consulting on removing the Wapping Bus Gate as part of a consultation to remove four of its Liveable Streets schemes.

Transport for London (TfL) was not initially and directly notified of LBTH's decision to consult on the removal of the bus gate. The bus gate was implemented in November 2019 with TfL Bus Priority funding that was not, in fact, part of the Council's Liveable S treets programme.

Tower Hamlets has the third lowest rate of car ownership across London boroughs with 71 per cent of residents not owning a car. Alongside this, Tower Hamlets has an

above average proportion of people choosing to use active travel modes, with 80.6 per cent walking, cycling, or using public transport on a regular basis.

A central aim of the Mayor's Transport Strategy is to prioritise schemes that make it safer and easier for people walking, cycling, and using public transport in the borough, with a target of 80% of journeys being made by these modes by 2040.

I am very concerned about the removal of the Wapping Bus Gate without the decision being supported by a full set of evidence, including how LBTH are meeting its public sector equality duty. If these issues are not satisfied it may impact TfL's decision on future funding.

I have written to LBTH to ask to meet to discuss this consultation further and to reiterate our concerns. More importantly still, this will be an opportunity to discuss the borough's plans to encourage people to walk, cycle or use public transport and how TfL and the Council can work together to improve air quality in the borough.
