1908	First integrated underground railway map showing all the lines, although still run separately by the different companies.	2002/264
1928	UERL – designed by F H Stingemore. The Central London Railway line is shown in orange. More space is allocated to show the lines in the central area.	1991/245
1928	UERL – Underground Map Of Central London Paper edition of the Underground map. Designed by F H Stingemore showing the Underground lines all printed in red with no key to differentiate between them. Line names are printed in the border.	1992/122
1933	First edition of Henry C Beck’s revolutionary diagrammatic map. No longer geographically based.	1991/248
1940	Wartime austerity single colour map. Designed by Hans Schleger and printed solely in brown with a light blue border.	1984/51/519

1949	Considered by Beck to be the best version of his diagram. Metropolitan and District are shown in different colours (purple and green) and the Circle line (formerly the Inner Circle) has its own colour, yellow.	1991/79

1968/9	Pocket Underground map, 1969. Designed by Paul Garbutt it is the first map to show the new Victoria line from Walthamstow Central to Victoria.	1984/51/651
1979	Pocket Underground map, No 1, 1979. This edition of the Underground map shows the newly opened Jubilee line running from Stanmore to Charing Cross.	1980/351/2
1985	The London Underground – diagram of lines and zones. Travelcards and Zones introduced for the first time in 1985.	1992/69
1987	Pocket Underground map, No 1 1987 with the title Journey Planner. It includes the new Docklands Light Railway from Stratford and Tower Gateway to Island Gardens.	1992/852
1999	The Jubilee Line extension to Stratford and the Docklands Light Railway extension to Lewisham are shown as open. The Jubilee Line no longer runs to Charing Cross.	1999/40233
2007	Pocket Underground map, November 2007. Overground appears with its own identity for the first time. The London Overground lines which came under TfL control are the North London line from Richmond to Stratford, the line from Clapham Junction to Willesden Junction, the line from Euston to Watford, and the line from Gospel Oak to Barking. The East London line is shown as closing in December for extension work prior to it becoming part of the London Overground network.	2007/11858
2009	Pocket Underground map, issued September 2009. This short-lived map was published without the River Thames.	2010/4266
