 Underground mode with line differentiation we recommend this is extended to Overground

BENEFITS


- A line differentiation approach will increase the usability and comprehension of the network.

- Referred to as 'The London Overground East London line' mirroring the LU approach of "The London Underground Jubilee line".




LONDON OVERGROUND - Current Map




