

The Weaver line

Liverpool Street to Enfield Town/Cheshunt/Chingford

The Weaver line celebrates an area of London shaped by the textile trade, from the French Huguenots and Irish weavers to Jewish refugees and South Asian migrants in the East End, all the way to the home of designer William Morris in Walthamstow.


The line speaks to the diverse migrant communities and individuals who have driven London's success over the centuries as a centre of fashion and textile innovation.



The Windrush line

Highbury & Islington to New Cross/Clapham Junction/Crystal Palace/West Croydon

Recognising the migrants who came to live in Britain between 1948 and 1971, often referred to as the Windrush generation in honour of the Empire Windrush, which docked in Tilbury in June 1948. The line runs through areas with strong ties to Windrush communities, such as Dalston Junction, Peckham Rye and West Croydon. Often met with discrimination and racism, the Windrush generation paved the way for future migration and continue to shape and enrich London's cultural and social identity today.

The Liberty line

Romford to Upminster

The Liberty line celebrates the freedom that is a defining feature of London, and references the motto of the London Borough of Havering and its historic status as a royal liberty.

The name reflects the independent spirit of this community, and celebrates how this London Overground line links its residents to the rest of the city, giving them the freedom to explore everything London has to offer.



The Lioness line

Watford Junction to Euston

The Lioness line celebrates the historic success of the England women's football team, who, during the summer of 2022, captivated the nation. The line runs through the heart of Wembley, where the Lionesses enjoyed their greatest triumph when they won UEFA Women's EURO 2022. The team are creating a lasting legacy that continues to inspire and empower the next generation of women and girls in sport.



The Mildmay line

Richmond and Clapham Junction to Stratford

This line honours the tenacity of the NHS and its smaller healthcare centres in caring for all Londoners. The Mildmay hospital first opened in the I860s to help nurse people in the East End's poorest slums. Following a short closure, Mildmay reinvented itself in the I980s to play a pivotal role in the HIV/AIDS crisis.

Today, it is an internationally renowned centre for patients with complex HIV-related illnesses, and a valued and respected place for the LGBTQ+ community.



The Suffragette line

Gospel Oak to Barking Riverside

Honouring the suffragettes, who fought for votes for women and paved the way for women's rights.

The line's name pays a special homage to the largely working-class suffragette movement in the East End, including the longest surviving suffragette Annie Huggett, who organised meetings in her local area in Barking.

The suffragette movement played a vital role in transforming Britain's democracy for the better.
